Pastor's Page

We are finally able to safely take steps to get back to normal. We are so thankful for the safety and efficacy of the vaccines, and for how widely they are available here in our country. The choir has reassembled and is ready to lead us in singing. The congregation can sing again, and although we will all still be wearing masks, it will be a long-awaited joy. Because the latest science has informed us that there is very little possibility of contact contamination, we can have the hymnbooks and Bible back in the pews, and, thankfully, the cushions.

Several groups have begun meeting in person again. The Deacons just met to fill boxes with goodies to send to our three college students. The Tracy Akins class has already been meeting in person. The Pastor's Sunday school class will start meeting May 2 in person, along with a zoom option for those who cannot attend. We are in the waiting line to have our internet upgraded with fiber optic cable so that we can live-stream our services and classes. They cannot give us an exact date, but probably within another 60 days, we should be up and running. In the meantime, we still record a video version of the service and post it on our church YouTube channel. We average now 30-50 views each week.

The Care Committee has resumed visits to our shut-ins. After a year of not being able to see our people face to face, they are so encouraged by our visits. I have resumed taking home-bound communion to our shut-ins too. They are so thankful to again be able to receive the sacraments.

Our ministries of compassion have continued unabated during the pandemic. We never stopped supplying all the 80 dozen (or more!) muffins made from scratch every month for the Sack Lunch Program. The need here in the River Valley is so great; SLP Director Jean Koljeski reported in February that "We served 33,629 lunches in 2020." We never stopped making monthly suppers for the Salvation Army, although we had to transition to "to go" versions. Nevertheless, they always got full, balanced, nutritious meals, from the main dish to homemade dessert. We never stopped collecting canned goods for the Community Clearing House, too, though the pandemic did affect our volume.

Other classes and ministries continue by zoom. The Monday Morning Seekers has been meeting by Zoom throughout the pandemic. Community groups like Police and Community Engagement (PACE) have continued by zoom. Several members of our congregation are active in PACE. Recently we started to receive training in the Bail Project which helps people who could not afford even a bail bondman's fees to be released, pending trial, just as people with sufficient income can. The Citizen's Climate Lobby which several of us are active participants in has also continued by Zoom. The work of passing a bipartisan climate bill continues, as more and more of our legislatures on both sides of the aisle become convinced by the overwhelming scientific evidence that climate change is real and poses an imminent danger to us. As Christians who believe that God is the Creator of this beautiful planet, we are particularly grateful for the work of CCL.

Other ministries have paused the pandemic. The Interfaith Fellowship is one. We hope it can resume its important work of increasing understanding and building relationships among different faith communities soon.

This is not over, and we all know that. The scenes from India are devastating! The variants are spreading like wildfire in unvaccinated populations. In poorer countries vaccination availability is much lower than here in the States. I just heard on Thursday that the Reformed pastors in Croatia have just received their Johnson and Johnson one-shot vaccinations. I am thankful for them, but my heart goes out to all those still waiting.

So, we are thankful that the worst of the storm is probably over, and that there is light at the end of the tunnel. We are thankful that our members have continued to be so faithful to support our church even when we could not be in person together. We are thankful that though the future is uncertain, we have the hope that God is with us and will make a way.

Central Presbyterian Church Fort Smith Arkansas

Cyber meeting held April 20, 2021.

Present: Steven Kurtz, Margaret Sparkman, Charles Cook, Sandra Barron, Suzanne Bethell, Galen Hunter, Cissy Rose, John Hale, Gary Simpson, and Mike McClure. Excused absence Debi Wilkinson.

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. CST with prayer by Steven Kurtz. The meeting was conducted by Zoom. The devotional and prayer were given by Cissy Rose. The devotional was from the book <u>The Sailboat Church</u>, by Joan S. Gray. Rethinking church is presented by the metaphor of a sailboat and a rowboat. The scripture lesson for the devotion was from Jeremiah.

The docket was approved as were the minutes from the March 16, 2021 meeting.

Pastor's Report- Steven reported that he is the Presbytery co-chair of the Matthew 25 initiative and was excited for the opportunity to participate. Steven also reported on those activities which are either being conducted by Zoom or can be attended in person. Steven and Jennifer made a trip to Springfield, Illinois to support Rev. Sonna B Key.

Clerks Report:

Committee Reports:

<u>Building and Grounds</u>: Galen Hunter reported that the final repairs to the HVAC system were made with the approval, last month, of \$640 in parts and labor. Mike McClure reported that ceiling repairs in the east entrance to the sanctuary were completed in time for the wedding of Joseph Pope, and Ann Marie McCollum which took place on April 23, 2021.

The contract for custodial services as amended from \$240 to \$310 per month with additional responsibilities. A motion to increase the monthly fee was made from B&G committee and passed on a vote of 9-1. Steven will manage the custodial service in accordance with the contract.

<u>Christian Education</u>: The Tracy Akins Sunday School Class has resumed in-person meetings, on Sunday morning at 9:00 a.m. lead by Linda Riley.

Outreach: NMNM Personnel: NMNM

<u>Stewardship/Financials</u>: NMNM- Mike McClure presented the financials with instructions for how to determine TPF fund balances more easily on a monthly basis from the Consolidated Financial Report. Monthly variances were discussed as was the year-to-date deficit between spending and income.

Visionary: NMNM

<u>Worship Committee</u>: Gary Simpson reported on the latest update from the committee regarding in-person worship. Gary also asked that after the Worship Committee meeting on April 25, 2021 that a cyber vote be taken on ongoing recommendations for in-person worship regarding topics such as having the choir sing without masks etc.

<u>New Business</u>: A continuing discussion about the current size of the session took place. The result was a motion that the session be immediately reduced from 12 members to 9 members. Discussion included congregational size and number of available members for service, timing of the change to make a smooth transition to other tasks before the session.

There was a protracted discussion on a request by Steven to form a "Timely Response Taskforce" to respond to social and political issues. Responses would be consistent with positions publicly held by P. C. USA. It was pointed out that often, not enough information was available to make a correct timely response. Additionally, several months ago the session was considering stepped up surveillance of the property because of community backlash for what was on the Rogers Avenue sign e.g., threats against the church building and personally against the Pastor. It was decided the issue needed more thought and the discussion was tabled before a motion was proposed.

Next months devotional is by Mike McClure.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:25 p.m. with prayer by Steven.
